PROPOSITION 86 TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THERE IS EVIL IN THE WORLD IS WISE, BUT TO BEWAIL IT IS FOOLISH, BECAUSE IT HAPPENS FOR GOOD REASON



PROPOSITION TIS A LAW OF NATURE THAT THE BEST THINGS GO TO THE BEST PEOPLE, THE POORER THINGS TO THE WORSE PEOPLE, THUS THERE IS NO REASON EVER TO COMPLAIN ABOUT 'WHAT PEOPLE GET'
